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- Explain how Chārvākas deny the validity of Nyāya view of anumāna.
- Give brief account of Triputipratyaksa vāda.

Answer any three questions. Each question carries nine marks.

- 'Jainism rightly points out that all our knowledge is necessarily relative, conditional and partial' – Analyse this statement explaining the distinction between pramāṇa and naya.

- 14. Examine the importance of anumāna and its classifications in Nyāya system.
- State and explain the six important pramāṇas accepted in Indian Philosophical schools.
- 'The Mimāmsakas advocate the self-validity of knowledge both in respect of its origin and ascertainment.' – Elucidate this statement highlighting the nature Svatpramānya vāda. (3×9=27)
